Ensure that all work is entirely your own. If you submit work generated by a computer, website, or artificial intelligence (e.g. ChatGPT) as your own work, this is considered malpractice and may result in a mark of zero. Specifications:

Writing in Japanese (20 marks) – 20%

You will be required to respond to a question related to your Personal Research Project that you completed in Modules FOUR to NINE of your course. The question will specify the audience, purpose, context and text type for your response. You will be required to write approximately 500 *ji* in JAPANESE.

Speaking (10 marks) – 10%

- This task will take place during an online session (e.g. Teams) on Wednesday 14 February, 2024. The time of your speaking assessment will be scheduled with the course co-ordinator at NSW School of Languages and confirmed to you and your Supervisor prior to the task. You must be **supervised by staff in your home school** in order to attempt this assessment.
- You will be required to present a **3-5-minute oral presentation** in Japanese in which you will present the findings of your Personal Research Project (Modules 4 to 9). You may use palm cards with key words and phrases and/or a PowerPoint presentation as support; however, these supports will not count towards your final mark. As sharing the knowledge gained by completing the project is an essential part of the learning for the whole class, your presentation will be recorded and may be shared in Canvas after the assessment.
- Your oral presentation will be followed by a **5-minute Q&A** session. The questions will be in the form of a conversation with a teacher, and will focus on your **research process, your personal reactions to your findings, and possible future applications of your research**. This session will also be recorded for marking but it **will NOT be shared**.

Feedback provided

The teacher will provide written feedback outlining strengths and areas for improvement to build on knowledge, understanding and skills for future learning.
