Assessment 3 and Assessment 4 are the **final** HSC Assessments for this course.

Date of Assessments 3 and 4: Tuesday, 28 July 2020

Venue:

- It is mandatory for students who attend school in the Sydney Metropolitan area to sit for the Speaking and Written assessments at the **NSW School of Languages**. The date of the assessment can only be **changed in exceptional circumstances and after consultation with the Department Head Teacher**. Students who cannot sit for the assessment on the above date for health reasons must send a medical certificate and complete an [Exam Change of Date or Venue](#) form. This form can be located on the school website by clicking the following link: [Forms and Guidelines](#).
- Non-Metropolitan students will do the Written assessment at their **home school on the above date**. This date can only be **changed in exceptional circumstances and after consultation with the Department Head Teacher**. A time will be organised for the Speaking test to be conducted by phone. Students who cannot sit for the assessment on the above date for health reasons must send a medical certificate and complete an [Exam Change of Date or Venue](#) form.

Time frame

- **Speaking** – 5 minutes
- **Written assessment** – 2 hours and 20 minutes (including 10 minutes reading time).

The paper will consist of three sections:

Section I – **Listening** (approximately 30 minutes)

Section II – **Reading** (approximately 50 minutes)

Section III – **Writing** (approximately 50 hour)

Scope and Format of Assessments 3 and 4

Marks and Weightings

The assessments will contribute **40%** to the internal HSC Assessment mark and will be distributed between course components as follows:

Procedures for Assessment 3 and Assessment 4

Sydney Metropolitan students only – Examination held at NSW School of Languages

- Students should arrive at NSW School of Languages at **8:45am**.
- Students are to bring a dictionary and their own food and drink, as they will not be permitted to leave the school grounds until they have completed the Examination. Students are requested to avoid bringing food containing nuts or nut products.

Non-Metropolitan Students – Examination held at the home school

- Supervisors are requested to contact the Head Teacher on (02) 9381 4910 if the audio file and the Examination paper are not received by **the week before the date of the examination** or if they are faulty.

- The Supervisor will be sent a link in advance to download the listening audio file by email.
- The Supervisor is expected to test prior to the day of the assessment, that the audio file is working on the computer/device that will be used. The device is to be a school-owned and not a student-owned device.
- Supervisors are requested to delete the audio file as soon as the Listening section is completed.
- Students **must be supervised** throughout the assessment.
- The date and time for the phone Speaking assessment will be confirmed for each student one week prior to the examination.
- Examinations should be held in a quiet room.

Description of Assessment 3

Speaking

This assessment is designed to assess the student's knowledge and skills in spoken Modern Greek.

Students are **NOT** permitted to take notes or dictionaries into the Speaking assessment

Specifications

- There will be a conversation in **MODERN GREEK** between the student and an examiner of approximately **5 minutes** duration.
- Topics of the conversation will be based on the main theme of *The Personal World* and may include:
 - Family life, home and neighbourhood
 - People, places and communities
 - Education and work
 - Friends, recreation and pastimes
 - Holidays, travel and tourism
 - Future plans and aspirations

Description of Assessment 4

Written Examination

Use of monolingual and/or bilingual print dictionaries **IS** permitted during this examination. However, they must not be annotated. **No electronic devices are allowed.**

Topics

All topics listed in the syllabus.

Section I - Listening

This examination is designed to assess the student's knowledge and skills in understanding and analysing information from spoken texts in Modern Greek.

Specifications

- Students will hear 7 items in Modern Greek. Each text will be read twice. There will be a brief pause between the first and second readings during which students may take notes. Sufficient time will be given after the second reading to complete responses.
- Students will be expected to respond to a range of question types such as completing a table, chart, list or form, or responding to multiple-choice or short-answer questions that will require a response in **ENGLISH**.

Section II - Reading

This examination is designed to assess the student's knowledge and skills in understanding and responding to written texts in Modern Greek.

Specifications

There will be 4 texts to test comprehension of written Modern Greek. The total length of the texts will be approximately 500 words in Modern Greek. Questions will be in English and will require answers in **ENGLISH**.

Section III - Writing

This section of the examination is designed to assess the student's ability to express ideas through the production of original texts in Modern Greek.

Specifications

Students will be required to answer **THREE** questions in **MODERN GREEK**.

Part A

Students will be expected to write **TWO** responses. The total expected length of the responses will be approximately **125 words in MODERN GREEK** using the required text type (e.g. postcard, note, short diary entry, email, message).

Part B

Students will be expected to answer **ONE** question out of two and write a response of approximately **125 words in MODERN GREEK**, using the required text type (e.g. diary entry, email, informal letter, script of a talk or article).

Criteria for Judging Performance

Speaking

In your answers you will be assessed on how well you:

- engage in a conversation
- select and incorporate particular vocabulary and structures to achieve specific communication goals
- structure information and ideas coherently
- demonstrate clarity of expression (pronunciation, intonation, stress).

Listening

In your answers you will be assessed on:

- how well you identify, summarise and interpret general and/or specific aspects of texts
- how accurately you convey the relevant information in English
- how well you identify and explain aspects of the culture of the Modern Greek-speaking communities.

Reading

In your answers you will be assessed on:

- how well you identify, summarise and interpret general and or specific aspects of texts
- how accurately you convey the relevant information in English
- how well you convey an intercultural understanding of Modern Greek-speaking communities.

Writing

Part A

In your answers you will be assessed on how well you:

- communicate relevant ideas and information
- write text appropriate to audience, purpose and context
- structure and sequence ideas and information
- demonstrate control of vocabulary and language structures in Modern Greek.

Part B

In your answers you will be assessed on how well you:

- communicate relevant ideas and information
- write text appropriate to audience, purpose and context
- structure and sequence ideas and information
- demonstrate control of a range of vocabulary and language structures in Modern Greek.

Assessment Confirmation Notice

Prior to attendance at the examination, the signed Assessment Confirmation Notice **must be completed and returned** to NSW School of Languages.

Arrival
