Assessment 3 and Assessment 4 are the **final** HSC Assessments for this course.

Date of Assessments 3 and 4: **Tuesday, 21 July 2020**

Venue:

- It is mandatory for students who attend school in the Sydney Metropolitan area to sit for the Speaking and Written assessments at the **NSW School of Languages**. The date of the assessment can only be **changed in exceptional circumstances and after consultation with the Department Head Teacher**. Students who cannot sit for the assessment on the above date for health reasons must send a medical certificate and complete an [Exam Change of Date or Venue](#) form. This form can be located on the school website by clicking the following link: [Forms and Guidelines](#).
- Non-Metropolitan students will do the Written Assessment at their **home school on the above date**. This date can only be **changed in exceptional circumstances and after consultation with the Department Head Teacher**. A time will be organised for the Speaking test to be conducted by phone. Students who cannot sit for the assessment on the above date for health reasons must send a medical certificate and complete an [Exam Change of Date or Venue](#) form.

Time frame

- **Speaking** – 10 minutes
- **Written assessment** – 2 hours and 30 minutes (plus 10 minutes reading time).

The paper will consist of three sections:

Section I – **Listening** (approximately 30 minutes)

Section II – **Reading** (approximately 1 hour)

Section III – **Writing** (approximately 1 hour)

Scope and Format of Assessments 3 and 4

Marks and Weightings

The assessments will contribute **40%** to the internal HSC Assessment mark and will be distributed between Course components as follows:

Procedures for Assessments 3 and 4

Sydney Metropolitan students only – Examination held at NSW School of Languages

- Students should arrive at NSW School of Languages at **8:45am**.
- Students are to bring a dictionary and their own food and drink, as they will not be permitted to leave the school grounds until they have completed the Examination. Students are requested to avoid bringing food containing nuts or nut products.

Non-Metropolitan Students – Examination held at the home school

- Supervisors are requested to contact the Head Teacher on (02) 9381 4910 if the audio file and the Examination paper are not received by **the week before the date of the examination** or if they are faulty.

- The Supervisor will be sent a link in advance to download the listening audio file by email.
- The Supervisor is expected to test prior to the day of the assessment, that the audio file is working on the computer/device that will be used. The device is to be a school-owned and not a student-owned device.
- Supervisors are requested to delete the audio file as soon as the Listening section is completed.
- Students **must be supervised** throughout the assessment.
- The date and time for the phone Speaking assessment will be confirmed for each student one week prior to the examination.
- Examinations should be held in a quiet room.

Description of Assessment 3

Speaking

This assessment is designed to assess the student's knowledge and skills in spoken Modern Greek. Students are **NOT** permitted to take notes or dictionaries into the Speaking assessment.

Specifications

- There will be a conversation between the student and an examiner of approximately 10 minutes duration. **No electronic devices are allowed.**
- The student will respond to the examiner's questions on the prescribed syllabus topics as they relate to the candidate's personal world.

Description of Assessment 4

Written Examination

- Use of non-annotated monolingual and/or bilingual dictionaries **IS** permitted during this examination.
- The stimulus texts and the writing tasks will relate to the topics as listed in the syllabus.

The paper will consist of three sections:

Section I - Listening

This section is designed to assess students' knowledge and skills in identifying and analysing information from spoken texts.

Specifications

- Students will hear approximately **6 items**. Each text will be read twice. There will be a brief pause between the first and second readings during which students may take notes. Students will be given sufficient time after the second reading to complete responses.

- Students will be expected to respond to a range of question types such as completing a table, chart, list or form, or responding to multiple-choice items that will require a response **in MODERN GREEK or ENGLISH**, as specified. There will also be short-answer questions that will require a response **in ENGLISH**.

Section II - Reading

This section is designed to assess students' knowledge and skills in identifying and analysing information from written texts and exchanging information in response to a text.

- In **Part A** students will be required to demonstrate understanding of text/texts written in Modern Greek.
- In **Part B** students will be expected to demonstrate both an understanding of a written text and the ability to respond in **MODERN GREEK** to information provided in the text.

Specifications

Part A

Students will be required to read **ONE** text in Modern Greek of approximately 400 words in total. Questions on the texts will be phrased in English for responses in **ENGLISH**.

Part B

- There will be one extended response question phrased in English requiring a response **in MODERN GREEK**.
- Students will be required to read a short text of approximately 100 words in Modern Greek such as a letter, email or other message, advertisement or notice.
- The question will specify the audience, purpose and context of the response.
- Students will be required to respond to questions and/or specific information in the text. The expected length of response will be approximately **120-150 words in MODERN GREEK**.

Section III - Writing

This section is designed to assess students' ability to express ideas through the production of original texts in Modern Greek.

Specifications

- Students will be required to respond to **TWO** questions, graded in difficulty. These questions will involve presentation of ideas and/or information and/or opinions. The questions will require different kinds of writing: the first will be informative or descriptive and the second will be reflective, persuasive or evaluative, and could require the student to explain or justify a point of view. Each question will specify the audience, purpose and context of the response.
- There will be no choice for the first question and students will be expected to write approximately **75 words in MODERN GREEK**. For the second question, there will be a choice of **two tasks** both of which require the same text type. Students will be expected to write approximately **200 words in MODERN GREEK**.
- The tasks will be related to the themes prescribed in the syllabus. They will be phrased in English for a response in **MODERN GREEK**.

Criteria for Judging Performance

Speaking

In your answers you will be assessed on how well you:

- engage in a conversation (comprehension, communication strategies)
- respond to a range of questions
- manipulate language in a range of contexts
- demonstrate knowledge of vocabulary and sentence structures
- speak with correct pronunciation and intonation.

Listening

In your answers you will be assessed on:

- how well you identify, analyse, summarise and evaluate general and/or specific aspects of texts
- how accurately you convey the relevant information in English
- how well you identify and explain aspects of the culture of the Modern Greek-speaking communities.

Reading

Part A

In your answers you will be assessed on:

- how well you identify, analyse, summarise and evaluate general and/or specific aspects of texts
- how accurately you convey the relevant information in English
- how well you identify and explain aspects of the culture of the Modern Greek-speaking communities.

Part B

In your answer will be assessed on how well you:

- respond to the stimulus text with relevant information and ideas
- write text appropriate to context, purpose and audience
- structure and sequence information and ideas
- demonstrate control of a range of language structures and vocabulary in Modern Greek.

Writing

In your answers you will be assessed on how well you:

- demonstrate the relevance of information, opinions and ideas
- write text appropriate to context, purpose and audience
- structure and sequence information, opinions and ideas
- demonstrate control of a range of language structures and vocabulary in Modern Greek.
