Principal's message

Welcome to 2016 at Open High School!



'm passionate about language teaching and learning and Open High School is a wonderful opportunity to inspire over 2000 students with the joy of engaging with a new language and culture.

Open High School is a place where students and teachers can flourish. We support the cognitive, emotional, social, physical and spiritual wellbeing of all students and colleagues.

Open High School is building a reputation for excellence, innovation and teacher and student capability. We had 10 students come First in State in last

year's Higher School Certificate and I'm very proud of the hard work from our students and teachers that this represents.

2016 will be an exciting year, with record enrolment figures and 3 new courses. Our new Year 11 Korean Beginners course has 50 students enrolled here and another 60 students in other schools. Our Indonesian 100 hours course is being shared with several other schools around the state. The new French Continuers course will be completed this year, for introduction in 2017. The year 9 Italian course is having a makeover too!

We also have to work towards moving our school at the end of this year. We have considered 18 sites around Sydney and still do not have a definite address. NSW Government Properties has begun negotiations with a landlord at one possible site, so I'll keep you posted.

Professional Learning for our teachers this year will include student and staff wellbeing, analysis of HSC data to improve outcomes, differentiation of teaching to best serve all students and the use of new technology. Several teachers are being mentored in Head Teacher positions to build up the leadership capabilities within the school.

All of our staff are now using an online record system called Millennium. This has required significant design input for our specialised needs and training of all staff - a big thank you to Ms Jannan Assaad, our R/Head Teacher, Teaching and Learning (eLearning). All contact with our students and lesson information can be recorded and monitored. Later in the year we hope to give parents and supervisors access to their child's feedback too.


Summary of the 2015 HSC results

Film training for Open High School teachers

Filmmakers Tim Nathan and Karina Banno came to Open High School and trained 14 teachers in film making and editing. They created a short film in the 3 hour workshop, discussing short film content, how to write a short film and use of different camera shots. Teachers looked at creating 3 scenes telling the journey of the main character. The teachers filmed 2 scenarios and then edited the film using Adobe Premier. Lighting, angles, props and extras were all taken into consideration. We're expecting some wonderful entries this year into the Modern Language Teachers Association Linguafest Film competition!


"Language Perfect is a fun way to learn the vocabulary. It strengthens your knowledge of grammar, script and expressions.

LATIN


PARENT FEEDBACK

RUSSIAN

The Importance of Identity

Many Open High School Russian students were born in or brought up in Australia. Others arrived from the new independent states - from the Ukraine to Central Asia. There are also students who are the descendants of so-called "White" Russians, those who served on the Chinese military railway or escaped after the Russian Revolution and settled in China or the countries of Europe for a few decades. Some of these families still refer to the Russian immigrants of the last four decades as the "newcomers".

These language students have a strong emotional link to the Russian language and through it to the Russian culture and its people. Learning Russian seems to have given them a sense of belonging and an enhanced sense of self.

Many of the newly arrived students work hard to master English when they come to Australia, and as a result, their Russian writing skills often deteriorate. One third of the students have, at some stage, attended Saturday Russian schools in Australia. These students have a good understanding of grammar and have been introduced to the highlights of Russian classical literature and history, but generally have a limited understanding of, or interest in, the broad Russian cultural context.

Given their diverse backgrounds, the question of cultural identity becomes a core issue.

For many students, the Russian language becomes an important part of their search for identity. One student, a Year 12 student from Russia who is of Armenian background, expressed the following opinion:

"I was raised in an Armenian family while living in Russia and I have learnt from both cultures. The two nations have been living together for a long time. I believe it is extremely important not to forget your language and culture. We are living in Australia now and our beautiful languages (Russian and Armenian) are all we have."





Open High School has conducted a destination report tracking the whereabouts of our school leavers. The information is used to help the school develop our vocational and educational programs.

Open High School had altogether over 670 entries for the HSC Exam in 2015. All of these were Higher School Certificate language courses, namely, Arabic, Chinese, English as Second Language, French, German, Indonesian, Italian, Japanese, Korean, Latin, Modern Greek, Portuguese, Russian and Spanish.

About 10 students were accelerated to do the HSC. These students will be in Year 12 at their home school in 2016. Amongst the Year 12 students (non-accelerants) who responded to the survey, around 98% chose to continue with tertiary education, with the vast majority of them having accepted offers from a university. Our students have accepted local, interstate or even overseas university offers. Some regional students chose to study at a university that was close to their residence.

Arts and education related courses gained the top spot (18%) for university offers for our students. Business and law programs attracted 11% of our school leavers. Offers for health and medical-related degrees were strong. Enrolment in international and global studies attracted 10% of the students. Around 25% of students intend to continue to study a language at university level. Some students will study a language as a minor in their degree program while others will learn one or more languages as their major studies and have plans to go to the target language countries. Other courses undertaken by students include games design and apprenticeship. Meanwhile, those choosing to defer their university study to take up a gap year make up 13% of our graduates.

Some 29% of students took advantage of the plethora of double degree opportunities. Degrees in law, commerce, arts and international studies predominated, often as part of a double degree.
