UNIVERSITY SCHOLARSHIPS

ongratulations to our Year 12 Japanese Continuers students *Noah Jago* (below) and *Aedan Southeren* (right) who received Asia Pacific University scholarships this month.

Noah Jago shares his application process experience:

While studying at Ristumeikan Asia Pacific University, students are able to choose between two streams: the college of International Management and the college of Asia Pacific Studies. Each stream is composed of four different areas of study. Through the college of International Management students are able to focus of one of the following: Accounting and Finance, Marketing, Strategic management and organisation or innovation and economics. The college of Asia Pacific Studies offers Environment and development, Hospitality and tourism, International relations and peace studies and Culture, society and media. Furthermore, students must complete compulsory language credits in Japanese. I am applying for the college of International Management: Accounting and

The university offers scholarships in varying increments which cover tuition fees only, not living costs, e.g. 50% tuition reduction scholarship. It's worth trying out for (only a page form to fill out).

When applying through
APU, most of the forms
can be completed
online, however they do
require you to send a
few documents via post.
The application period
is fairly early in the year
and quite short (although
there are multiple application
periods), hence I would recommend
being proactive and having the docu

being proactive and having the documents ready early to send off, as you must take into account the time that it takes for the documents to reach the university. They also like for you give the applications department tracking numbers for any of the documents that you send to the university.

You will require a letter of recommendation as part of your application which can be downloaded from the website, however please note that it must be either the original letter of recommendation or one with a digital signature (they don't like printed or scanned copies). The university is also interested in extra-curricular activities as well as academics, so if you are able to have at least one or two it would be useful. I volunteered at school and nursing homes for a few hours each month.

About the interview:

The interview happens on Skype, so I would suggest organising the set-up beforehand. There are two interviewers, one who speaks in English and the other in Japanese. For the most part, only the English speaker asks questions, however you will be asked to speak a little bit of Japanese if you know any. They asked me to do a self-introduction and asked about my hobbies. They will ask a few questions about your application,

e.g. extra-curricular activities, why you want to attend APU, what you want to study. They will also ask you about the stream and specific area of study that you would like to focus on. Also my tip would be to just relax and treat it as a conversation - they are just trying to get to know you as part of the application.


KEVIN LEE LATIN QUIZ

GAP YEAR LANGUAGE STUDY

Opportunities for Year 12 Gap year language study at Charles Sturt University (CSU)

My name is Russell Daylight and I'm a Lecturer in English at Charles Sturt University in Bathurst. We're currently introducing language education into the Arts curriculum, in order to give high school Languages students an option to continue their language studies.

CSU is trying to increase the opportunities for language study and international experience, particularly for students from Regional NSW. It is a long project and the first step is to create the Diploma of Language and Culture. This one-year course allows a student to study overseas for 6 months, and also take International Relations and 3 other electives from CSU. The trip is arranged by CSU Global.

HSC language students are the ideal audience for this course. Whilst a few students might progress with further language studies at university, most HSC language students never develop their skills beyond Year 12. We'd like them to deepen and embed those skills by taking a gap year with study. We see this as extending the

capabilities of language students, and improving their employment opportunities. They see a bit of the world, improve their language skills, and get advanced standing (credit) into the Bachelor degree of their choice.
