NATIONAL LANGUAGES COMMUNITY SCHOOL CONFERENCE

National Languages Community Schools Conference was held on Saturday 8 October at the University of Sydney. There were 561 delegates attended representing 133 different languages from across Australia and 495 different Community schools. The theme was "One language helps you cope with life, 2 languages helps you live life." Three Open High School teachers: *Vince Nave, Maria Lomis* and *Astra Vilkins*, presented highly praised workshops on Classroom games, Classroom Management, Autism and Teaching from authentic texts.

In NSW, 60% of the Community Languages Schools are held in public schools. There are 70 languages on the SBS radio station.

Listening to other people's experiences was highly insightful and broadened our understanding of the qualities of a true leader. Overall, the day was extremely enjoyable and informative. LANGUAGES IN ACTION

Tim Vaughan from Language Perfect New Zealand held a workshop for Open High School teachers demonstrating the new features of Languages in Action. A short

It provides Speaking, Listening, Reading and Writing resources and gives access to past examination papers from the Victorian and New Zealand HSCs. Languages in Action also offers literacy and numeracy exercises in the target language. The new Proficiency tests direct and assist students in ascertaining their strengths and weaknesses in language learning - automatically informing students where they need to improve and providing extra drills in the areas of weakness. Students can also write a task in the target language and submit it to Language Perfect online and have it marked automatically according to the NSW HSC marking guidelines.

Our students who have enrolled this year with Language Perfect have access to Languages in Action. The 2017 Language Perfect application is available now. Open High School students are invited to subscribe to Language Perfect- Languages in Action.

open High School is proud to announce the recipient for the 2016 Deadly Kids award - Chelsea Inman from Year 9 Latin.

"My Aboriginal story will resonate with many other people of indigenous descent. My great grandfather was a member of the stolen generation, and as such I have



very little information about his people group and culture. I am proud of my indigenous heritage and my family and I are working hard at researching and reconnecting with our Aboriginal family group. I live in Darkinjung country and take every opportunity to participate in local Aboriginal community events and leadership training. I have participated in Aboriginal Dance groups, representing my school and culture to the general public.

I am studying Latin because it comes easily to me and I like the predictable patterns and structures within the language. I enjoy seeing how the modern English language has evolved from Latin and I like studying ancient Roman culture and mythology. I was pleasantly surprised to find that the study of Latin has enhanced my results in English and Biology as well. I have found distance learning to be challenging but worthwhile. At first I struggled to set a pace for my work without a class to measure my progress against, but over time I found that self-reflection and personal goal setting allowed me to achieve more than I could have if I was on a fixed schedule. I think that

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this will help to prepare me for tertiary studies which seem to be more centred on distance learning than when my parents attended university. Phone lessons have proved to be beneficial as we often cover things that are not necessarily in the course but still useful to understand and appreciate, such as unseen texts or texts from different courses.

In the future I intend to complete an engineering degree at the University of Technology, Sydney and seek a career in Naval engineering with the Australian Defence Force. I currently study engineering as my other elective and I like the precision and innovation required to create function based robotic devices. I hope that one day I will be involved in designing innovative maritime vessels that will protect and enable our defence personnel as our defence personnel protect and enable us."



VIDEO CONFERENCING AND GOOGLE DOCS

Open High School teachers can video conference, use Skype or Adobe Connect when practising speaking with our students. Teachers also use Google Docs or Inkerz during our phone lessons to share the lesson notes, internet links and photos in a permanent record for later revision.

The advantage of my course is that they allow us sufficient free time for researching as well as working part time.

I attend classes 3 times a week and the rest of the week I work for 3 different companies. One involves dealing with overseas customers in a computer software company. Another, is working as a customer service representative for Apple and also translating documents for a translation company. As I live near Tokyo, there are a lot more opportunities to do what I would like to do and my life is much more fulfilled.

L started learning Korean last year at the university and have a plan to study in Korea for a short time. It's been a while since I have felt as excited as when I first started learning Japanese at the Open High School."

SPANISH

Spanish Language Teachers Conference of NSW

A large number of Spanish teachers met at the 11th annual Spanish Language Teachers Conference in October. It was an invaluable opportunity to exchange ideas and share resources and expertise with colleagues from Australia and overseas. There were presenters from Sydney, the ACT, Queensland, New Zealand and the Philippines.

The Director of the Cervantes Institute opened the event and the first presentation was delivered by Dr. Leonel Alvarado, Senior Lecturer in Spanish at the University of New England. He delighted the audience with an historical recount of the bolero dance form and its significance in recent Latin American culture and history. Throughout the day several experts presented papers on different aspects of teaching Spanish language. A special focus was dedicated to the teaching

and learning of Spanish through language immersion (CLIL), with a Skype presentation from Mr Fernando Zapico, Spanish Education Advisor in the Philippines. Mr Jesus Bergas Paz, Head of International Studies at Indooroopilly State High School in Queensland, added depth to the subject by presenting his school's Spanish language immersion program, which is unique in Australia.

Other presentations throughout the day included practical demonstrations of classroom activities focused on the use of technology, of music and rhythm and of language devices to extend vocabulary and to improve pronunciation and overall language awareness.

During the conference the NSW Spanish Teachers Association voted our Open High School's Cesare Popoli as Vice-President. Our teachers will bring their newfound knowledge to their teaching at Open High School, to improve the engagement and learning outcomes for our students.

n November, Open High School Year 9-12 Russian students had an exciting opportunity to attend the Russian Film Festival "Russian Resurrection". They saw a masterpiece of the 20th century world cinema "Ivan the terrible" by the internationally acclaimed film director Sergei Eisenstein.

This excursion enhanced students' socio-cultural experiences and was a rare educational opportunity to see this stand-out of Russian and world cinema on the big screen in the original language.

For our students this excursion provided a deeper understanding of Russian language, history and culture and a further appreciation of the wealth of learning opportunities available to language students at Open High School. Students and teachers had a very enjoyable day and planning is already underway for a film excursion next year.

Cultural events and face-to-face lessons each term at Open High School provide the students of Russian with the opportunity to find new friends and to seek further assistance and support.
