INTERCULTURAL EXCHANGE IN NEW CALEDONIA

HOW TWO OF OUR FRENCH TEACHERS SPENT THEIR SPRING HOLIDAY

privilege of travelling to New Caledonia to take part in a language immersion program for French teachers. Sixteen teachers from across NSW and Victoria spent two weeks "living" the French language. Our program was generously sponsored by the French Government, the University of New Caledonia, the New Caledonia Tourist Bureau and the NSW Association of French Teachers (NAFT).

From the moment we set foot on New Caledonian soil we were welcomed warmly. Each of us was hosted by a local family who provided accommodation, meals, outings and the opportunity to be engaged in the local way of life. Joining in the conversation while sitting at the meal table with the families or on outings around the town, gave us lots of opportunity to listen to and participate in conversations in authentic settings.

During the week we attended conducted in French classes at the University of New Caledonia. Topics ranged from the language of laughter and comedy, grammar, poetry and drama, phonetics and colloquial French. We also studied the history and culture of the local Kanak people and the importance of the spoken language in their culture. We were entertained by a local theatre group whose mission it is to form a "bridge" between the European and Kanak people through music, drama and poetry.

We later spent a day at the Centre Culturel Tjibaou, a centre for Kanak culture where we were welcomed in the traditional way by the Chief of one of the local tribes. This involved the giving and accepting of gifts and mutual exchange of greetings. We prepared and then shared

a traditional feast, a *bougna*, with food wrapped in banana leaves and cooked in a pit of hot rocks and coals. We then ate from plates we had made ourselves by weaving palm fronds. Later we were guided through the three traditional huts representing the three geographical areas of New Caledonia. We then explored the galleries and interesting exhibits of Kanak history and culture in the stunning building designed by world-renowned architect Renzo Piano.

Another aspect of our immersion program involved visiting high schools in Noumea, where we observed and took part in classes, noting the similarities and differences in pedagogy compared to our schools back here in Australia. The teachers and students there were all very welcoming and keen to keep in contact with us with the aim of creating opportunities for linguistic and cultural exchanges in the future.

The immersion program was of great benefit to us both personally and professionally. We have gained competence and confidence in our French speaking and have a greater understanding of our nearest Francophone neighbour. We have already started to incorporate our new skills and knowledge into our lessons and programs. We have very happy memories of the warm and charming people that we met and look forward to maintaining contact and even returning one day soon to this fascinating and beautiful island.

INDONESIAN

A TASTE OF INDONESIA AT TUMBARUMBA HIGH SCHOOL

Year 7 students at Tumbarumba High School are now 8 months into a trial program fulfilling the mandatory 100 hours of language learning in their high school. The program also fuels interest in aspects of Indonesian language and culture.

Indonesian teachers, Ida Harsojo and Danielle Elvy from NSW School of Languages organised a cultural enrichment day at the school on 28th August. This was an opportunity to provide the students with an authentic Indonesian cooking demonstration of Nasi Goreng (fried rice) & Pisang Goreng (fried bananas) and for students to participate in a simulated Indonesian market experience.

A representative from the Consul General of the Republic of Indonesia also came to the cultural day. When he addressed the students, he stressed the importance of all students learning a second language. He explained how learning English in Indonesia brought him to working for the Indonesian Department of Foreign Affairs.

Ms Harsojo and Ms Elvy taught the students about Indonesian markets, food and wares sold at the markets and how to bargain. Students then created conversations between sellers and their customers. They were given

replica Indonesian money to practise their bargaining skills in Indonesian. This was challenging as there are quite a few zeros in the Indonesian currency!

Later, experienced chef, Mr Oetomo, husband of Mrs Harsojo, gave a cooking demonstration. The Year 9 Food Technology class joined the language students and paid close attention, as they would be cooking the Indonesian dishes themselves in their next class. Most students had never heard of Nasi Goreng, let alone tasted it. Students were guided through the cooking steps and were given the opportunity to taste-test 2 varieties. This was then followed by a fun and simple dessert of fried bananas. For this, students wrapped a small amount of caramel and banana into a spring roll pastry which was then cooked by the teachers.

The face to face lesson day is a highlight of the remote course, as it adds variety to the students' regular video conference lessons and online study. Hopefully students will bring some Indonesian flavours to their own family.

This remote trial fosters understanding between Australia and Indonesia, creating the foundations for ongoing long-term and meaningful relations.
