ADF Long Tan Future Innovation Award

Esther Nelson, Year 12 student at Katoomba High School has received the NSL-nominated ADF Long Tan Future Innovations Award 2022.

Esther studies German Continuers at NSL and has proved to be a conscientious, hard-working student throughout the past two years. She studies German out of interest as part of her family is from Germany, and she has lived some years in Germany herself. Her main academic interest, however, is Mathematics and the Sciences. Due to having been accelerated in primary school, Esther is the youngest student in her cohort at KHS.

Throughout high school Esther excelled in both, Mathematics as well as Science, coming first every year. She studied four-unit Mathematics and Physics in her senior years and enjoyed the challenge of it.

Recently, Esther has started to investigate university courses available and found she is most interested in an Advanced Science course, majoring in Mathematics and Physics. This course will provide her with a wide variety of opportunities in scientific research within universities, the industry as well as the Defence Force.

Esther realises that the Australian Defence Force provides young people like her, who love STEM subjects, with an abundance of opportunities to excel in what they love doing. One of these opportunities, she would be interested in, is doing a STEM Cadetship, which supports the participant's undergraduate study financially while providing them with real-world experience. This presents an ideal chance for young innovators like Esther, allowing them to study, face exciting challenges and gain innumerable new experiences, all while getting paid.

Students can also write a task in the target language and submit it to Education Perfect Languages online and have it marked automatically according to the NSW HSC marking guidelines.

Ellen Rowley

"I'm Ellen, a second-year university student studying French, Sociology, and Education. I studied French Continuers at NSL, and as I am still studying and exposing myself to the language and culture, I have come to realise why learning another language is so special. Upon reflection, I think what really empowered me to continue studying French was the routine one-on-one interaction between my teachers and me at NSL. I could only follow my interest in the French language, culture, and history by having a strong rapport with my teachers.

I was looking for a great adventure after graduating high school in 2019, and so, like many people my age, I asked Google. The <u>Teaching</u> <u>Assistant Program in France (TAPIF)</u> was the best answer: a sevenmonth teaching job in French schools open to English and French speakers from a range of countries. I was really wishing for Grenoble because the idea of tall sharp mountains was exciting for me - an Australian used to a sunburnt country of sweeping plains. Instead, I was placed in the small city of Amiens in the north Picard region. Upon arriving I was a bit skeptical because the flat farming landscape and post-war architecture didn't match the classically romantic image of France in my mind. But little by little I've really started to feel a sense of belonging in this new place far from home!

Each week I work 12 hours between two middle schools with students aged between 11 and 15 in their English classes. So far, I've spent most of this time working with small groups of students helping support their conversation skills, which I think has been as rewarding for the students as it has been for me. I am making a lot of mistakes and learning in French like they are in English which creates a beautiful symbiosis. From every mistake comes a lesson and something new learned.

Northern hospitality is not a stereotype; kind and generous people have invited me into their homes and patiently listened to my French. When they ask me why I learn French I say to meet people like them who can teach me about their culture and my own. More than seeing the Eiffel Tower or fulfilling any other grand idea of France, it continues to be the little moments shared with people which feel the most special. Like carving a Halloween pumpkin with the daughters of one of my teaching colleagues, meeting the Principal's cat at her house, getting bread from the boulangerie on the corner with my flatmate for the first time, or visiting the Amiens floating gardens with a few other language assistants from the United States and India.

When I initially chose to do French Continuers at NSL and then minor in French at university, my main reason was practical. That is, French opens doors for career development but now I've come to realise that learning a foreign language can offer so much more. It can open doors into the homes of new-found friends on the other side of the globe."

Of course, celebrating such a famous Hispanic festivity at NSL couldn't go unnoticed and our creative students had the chance to write their own literary *Calaveritas* for Year 9 Spanish.

For the activity, students had to spin a wheel where different words were assigned at random and students had to compose their literary *Calaverita* based on these words. Although a challenge, one student, Sebastian Olmedo, successfully wrote his own one... the words were *cenizas* (ashes) and *cigarro* (cigarette) - see below.
