Appreciation Night for Excellence in Indonesian



A rewarding experience: Learning Indonesian at NSL

Switching from learning Indonesian in a face-to-face setting to distance learning in Year 11 was undoubtedly a decision made with hesitation. Initially I was quite skeptical of the effectiveness of distance learning, particularly for a subject in which face-to-face contact is especially crucial for the development of speaking skills such as pronunciation. However, my perspective soon changed as I began to appreciate the similarly immersive language learning experience and flexibility that NSL was able to provide. Much to my pleasant surprise, distance learning not only did not compromise the quality of teaching, but also improved my time management skills as I had to take initiative to conduct self-learning activities, which were both enjoyable and highly beneficial.

Then came 2021, a year like no other - significant COVID-related disruptions included cancellation of HSC speaking exams, postponement of HSC exams, and above all, a lingering sense of uncertainty which rendered staying focused and motivated incredibly difficult, if not impossible. Fortunately, the COVID-19 pandemic had little impact on the way NSL courses were delivered. Unlike traditional schools which had to frantically move to an online model, NSL, as a distance education school, already had well-established systems in place to facilitate remote learning, which meant disruption to my language learning was minimal.

With the unwavering support of my teacher, Ms Ida Harsojo, a passionate educator who truly cared about delivering the best educational outcomes for students, I thoroughly enjoyed learning Indonesian and developed a strong interest in Indonesian culture. Not only did she explain convoluted concepts with clarity, she also went above and beyond to provide me with every assistance I required throughout my time at NSL.

In the 2021 HSC, I was ranked second in NSW for Indonesian Continuers, which serves as a testament to both the effectiveness of NSL's model and the benefit of being taught by experienced educators who have a lifelong passion in nurturing young minds. I am incredibly proud of my achievement in Indonesian, and could not be more grateful for the important role NSL and Ms Harsojo played in my challenging, but also greatly rewarding journey of Indonesian learning.

24 January - Thursday of the Smoke of Grilled Meat

Tsiknopempti literally means 'Thursday of the Smoke of Grilled Meat'. It is part of the Carnival season in Greece and Cyprus where large amounts of meat are eaten prior to the start of the fasting period, Lent, 11 days later on *Kathara Deftera* (Clean Monday).



The three-week period before the start of Lent is called *Apokries* (Carnival) and it is a festival season. *Apokries* typically involves a public celebration and/or parade combining some elements of a circus, masks and a public street party. People wear masks and costumes during many such celebrations, allowing them to lose their everyday individuality and experience a heightened sense of social unity.

The Thursday of the second week of the *Apokries* is called *Tsiknopempti*. Traditionally it is a day dedicated to consuming large amounts of meat as grilled souvlaki. City and town governments set up grills in central squares with music, too. *Tsiknopempti* is celebrated 11 days before *Kathara Deftera*.


Kathara Deftera is the first day of Lent. Clean Monday is a public holiday in Greece and Cyprus, where it is celebrated with outdoor excursions/picnics, the widespread custom of flying kites and the consumption of shellfish and other fasting food, such as a special bread baked only on that day called *lagana*.



Orientation lessons on Zoom this term

All the Japanese students learnt about Zoom etiquette. Term 1 Week 5 has kept the Japanese teachers busy connecting to all our new students enrolled in Year 9, Year 10 (100 hours), Year 11 Continuers and Beginners and In Context Japanese courses.

- Year 9 and 10 (100 Hour) students learnt and revised expressions in Japanese from the Canvas Module 1 and 2 course. The students read and recognised Hiragana script using the resource called Education Perfect
- Year 11 Beginners students' focus was to revise the Canvas course Modules. They learnt how "not to knock themselves out" - Japanese style introductions and enjoyed a trivia session using hiragana. Year 11 Continuers students met their Japanese sensei by watching their videos introducing themselves in Japanese. The students heard the introductions by Naito sensei, Shipolova sensei and Shiragaki sensei, followed by answering questions about each teacher.
- Year 11 and 12 In Context students turn to connect with their Japanese teachers. The students enjoyed connecting with each other and their new teachers. Year 12 Continuers students prepared for their upcoming Assessment 2.



Tips on being a successful distance education student

- Make sure you have time in your school day to complete language work, do not use this time to complete homework for other subjects. It is easy to fall behind in the coursework and very difficult to catch up. Being organised and self-disciplined is a necessity!
- Do not rush through your work. Teachers have given much thought to selecting activities and quizzes these need to be completed in sequential order. If you do not understand, reach out to your teacher and ask for clarification.
- Have your questions ready for your speaking lesson. Your online speaking allows you to collaborate with your teacher and ask questions about the content or quizzes. If you are not sure about a grammar point, check online for an explanation.
- Explore your technology, make sure you attend orientation lessons that explain navigation in Canvas or Moodle. Tell your teacher as soon as possible if you are having issues with technology or are unsure of how to do something. Check your email regularly; each student at NSL will have an education email. Make sure you check this one!
- Actively participate in group collaboration or group tasks; these are the best parts of the course where you
 get to meet and work with other students!
- Always refer to the course schedule and date for assessment tasks. Set yourself reminders. Unfortunately, forgetting to do a task is not a good excuse.
- Make the most of your distance learning experience; you will learn valuable skills to help you in your future studies and enjoy your study of languages!
