

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Principal's message

Dear School Community,

The one-on-one lessons, although daunting at first, quickly grew to be enjoyable and inspiring as my teacher, Ibu Chris, journeyed with me through my learning. Through my studies, my eyes were opened to new aspects of my identity and I grew to understand a whole new culture and society. I personally experienced how the mentorship and guidance from a teacher can build and inspire oneself. Seeing this impact in myself sparked a new dream. I wanted to become a teacher. Education truly shapes the minds and lives of students and I wanted to be a part of the positive influence that I experienced first-hand. I have been blessed to return to the very school which inspired and shaped me for my final teaching internship.

Once a beginning language learner at the NSW School of Languages, I am now a multilingual teacher standing at the beginning of my professional career as an educator."

We now anxiously await our HSC results and are in the midst of planning for 2024. For the students and families who have come to the end of their studies, I wish you all the best for your future. And remember that languages open doors to new cultures, fostering global understanding and enriching personal perspectives. Proficiency in multiple languages enhances communication skills, creating opportunities for diverse connections and fostering a more inclusive and interconnected world.

Year 12

Student exchange program experience in South Korea!

"Hi! My name is Citrine and I am currently doing an exchange program in Daegu (대구) South Korea for three months from August to November."

Why did you choose to go on exchange to Korea?

"I chose to go to Korea for my exchange because I have been studying the Korean language for over three years. I am also deeply interested in the culture, music, media, and food. I thought it would also be a great experience to improve my Korean skills as well as get to know what life is like as a Korean student."

Where are you staying?

"I am currently staying in Daegu, which is the third largest city in South Korea following Seoul and Busan. To be a bit more specific, I live in the north part of Daegu called Buk-gu. I am currently living with a really sweet host family where I live with a host Mum, Dad and two younger sisters."

How is your school experience? Is it different to school in Australia?

"School in Korea is quite different to Australia. The school day typically starts early and ends quite late. One of the major differences is that classes are held in one classroom where teachers move from class to class. This is unless you have special subjects such as art, music, and sports where students have to go to separate classrooms. As expected, Korean students are very passionate and diligent about their studies. Most of the students attend private tutoring after school. There is also something called yaja (이자), which are night study periods at school that start right after school ends and finishes at 9pm. During this time, students do their homework or catch up on individual study. Yaja is not compulsory, but many students attend to revise and consolidate their study.

I believe the language skills that I learnt from NSL helped me on my exchange program to a great extent. Knowing the school subject names beforehand came in handy when adjusting to life here. The cultural lessons have also been helpful in understanding the traditional and historical background of Korea. Learning Korean at NSL also taught me valuable cultural lessons such as showing respect to one another and social etiquette in the community."

What are some of the highlights of your exchange?

"If I were to mention just one highlight of my exchange it would be going to E-World with my school friends after school. E-World is one of the most popular amusement parks in Daegu.

The biggest highlight was riding the roller coasters, eating food from the stalls, going ice skating, and staying out until the park closed.

Everything in Korea is also located in close proximity, making it very convenient. I was surprised to find five convenience stores within a 10-minute walk from my house. There are also various restaurants and unique shops such as study cafes (a café to drink tea and study), comic book cafes, cat cafes (you can play with cats while you have tea), PC room and Noraebang singing room), which are common in Australia."

Did you make new friends?

"I made many new friends and close acquaintances during my time here! I spend time with other exchange students from all around the world, who also live in Daegu, alongside my classmates who I hang out and spend the most time with. They've all been really supportive, fun, kind, and helpful with helping me adjust to my new setting."

Would you recommend going on exchange to other students?

"I would definitely recommend if not encourage those who are considering going on an exchange trip to not hesitate! It's such a wonderful, eye-opening experience that teaches you resilience, courage, acceptance, love, and tolerance."

Nihongo Tanken Centre excursion

Thirty students and three teachers travelled to Kirrawee High School to visit the Nihongo Tanken Centre on Wednesday 20 September.

The Tanken centre provides a stimulating and authentic Japanese environment for students to develop their Japanese language skills. *Nihongo Tanken* means exploring Japanese in the sense of an adventurous expedition into Japanese language and culture.

When the students and teachers arrived, they were asked to remove their shoes at the entrance hall called the genkan, because they were walking on tatami hand woven straw mats. The centre is like a separate house built on the site of Kirrawee High School. The students were immersed in the Japanese language (with no English) for the day. The students were divided into teams completing activities within the four skills-speaking, listening, reading and writing.

Year 9 and 10 Lesson Days

Year 9 and 10 (100 hour) Japanese students, for their lesson day, worked on exam technique, created *Orizome* (Japanese traditional scrolls) and were introduced to the art of folding material (*furoshiki*) to carry belongings. To make the *Orizome*, the students folded and tied very thin Japanese paper into a small triangle, then dipped this into food colour dye. After eating an authentic Japanese obento lunch, students opened their dried artwork which revealed a colourful, unique pattern. This was attached to the student's name written in Japanese calligraphy to make their Orizome. The furoshiki session was presented online from the Japan Foundation. Students created cloth carriers for drink bottles, laptops, books and even watermelons!

Reflections from Year 12 Indonesian students

"My choice to learn a language for Year 11 and 12 was an easy one. I've always enjoyed the rewarding nature of learning new languages and the culture that comes with it, so when it came to picking my units, I knew what I wanted to do. I chose Indonesian for two reasons; my dad studied Indonesian for his HSC and in university and so did my grandparents. Another reason was how easily I could apply this language during my family's almost annual trips to Indonesia.

Learning a language in a completely online environment was a learning curve from the usual classroom environment. It required constant motivation ensuring that you allocate enough time to complete modules on time and being prepared for the weekly speaking lessons with your teacher. Personally, having a completely online course provided relief from the other five subjects and it gave me time for quiet study and wasn't too drastic thanks to COVID-19 online learning. Another reason why I highly enjoyed studying at NSL was the in-person lessons that occurred once a term. It was here where I really polished my skills and compared and made friends with the other people in my course and ultimately made the experience of learning Indonesian feel more connected and enjoyable.

In Year 12, due to the similar learning format from Year 11, I was able to adjust and learn from my mistakes in Year 11 to more effectively learn the language. Making sure I knew my vocab back to front was my weak point across the entire course so, with the help of the Quizlets that NSL provided, I was able to allocate time out of school to revise my vocab and make note of the vocabulary that was more commonly used compared to the niche words that only appear in certain topics.

I am not going to lie, learning a language is hard, but with unconditional support from my teacher, Mrs Harsojo, and her constant feedback and areas I could improve in, Indonesian quickly became one of the most rewarding and enjoyable subjects. This was made clear when I travelled to Bali in January 2023 and was able to have conversations with the locals and let them also give me tips on how to improve or substitute for words to speak in more colloquial phrases. Just watching the reactions of a tourist saying simple phrases such as "What's the time?", "your house is beautiful", or "That's too expensive!" in their language was so rewarding and I encourage everyone to (if possible) make an effort to learn the local languages of places you may visit to share in this same rewarding experience.

I have thoroughly enjoyed my Indonesian Beginners learning experience at NSL and although it had its challenges, its unique learning style and quality of teachers, as well as providing the gift of communication made this experience one that I will forever be grateful for."

Students were able to spend 10 minutes conversing with Indonesian teachers and volunteers from The Australian Indonesian Youth Association before rotating to another speaker. This allowed students to become more comfortable talking to different people and also provided an opportunity to get different feedback from teachers from other schools.

There was a break for morning tea when we could chat with other students while sipping on some delicious Teh Botol (Indonesian sweet tea) and eating some Indonesian snacks such as Beng Beng (Indonesian chocolate bar with rice bubbles).

Overall, I found the day to be very valuable. Practice like that proved vital in improving my fluency before the oral exam, and as a distance ed student, it gave me the opportunity to meet other Indonesian students. I'm very grateful to the Monte Saint Anglo College, volunteers from AIYA and the teachers who gave up their time to make this day for us. It was memorable and very helpful."

Bubbling with childish excitement, we marched through Sydney airport. No adults, we were free, and ready to find our gate to set off on the journey of a lifetime. I settled down on the plane and made friends with my flight partner - one of the four winners from Australia. And though I was beyond grateful for the opportunity ahead of me, I was filled with a deep sense of trepidation. I wasn't allowed to speak English for the next four weeks - my German wasn't that good; it was my first time overseas – no parents to guide me; how would I make friends without English? And though these fears were rational, and I will not understate the struggle of being in a country where you can't speak the language, I need not have worried.

After those exhausting 26 hours in the air, it was easily the best month of my life. Why? Well, countless incredible experiences, lifelong friends and more. But mainly because I could just be. Away from the hubbub of Sydney, away from my friends and family and community, I was able to simply be myself. And from my initial struggle, trying to connect with my group and understand my tour guide, by the end I think I was a changed person – better at German sure, but also gifted with the independence and confidence of knowing I can survive and thrive away from the comfortable familiarity of home. Perhaps that's why I was so devastated to leave on the last day; we all were, because we knew that we had built something special there in Germany – friendships across hundreds of countries, incredible experiences, and a shared sense that the world was at our fingertips.

But what did we do there? Well, the first lovely week we spent in Bonn. There we did historical and political tours, ate delicious food, attended a university seminar, hiked to castle Drachenberg with old dragon legends, and presented all about our country at an international evening.

Next up the little old spa city, Bad Homburg, very near Frankfurt, where we spent two weeks living with host families. It was possibly the most worthwhile experience of the whole program. I did everything with my host sister: cycling to school, ballroom dancing, eating ice-cream with her grandparents, swimming in a lake and so on.

With a teary farewell we left for Munich, where the travelling began again. Aside from the occasion where I was utterly lost in a crowd without a phone, this city treated us very well, with (another!) castle, traditional Bavarian food and the obligatory (alcohol-free) beer. But my finest memory is climbing Zugspitze where we froze while tobogganing and fighting with snowballs, before descending to a gorgeous alpine lake where the temperature was surprisingly sunny, and we swam and paddled swan boats.

And finally, Berlin, a city buzzing with culture and arts. We visited unique installations, the Reichstag, Christopher Street Day, and a live Cabaret musical performance.

That brings us back to the final night where we came together as an international group for the last time and partied until late. It was hard to say goodbye, but now back at home in my same old routines, I feel proud and confident to be a world citizen, with global friends, and a special place in my heart for Germany."

Why did you choose to study French?

"I picked French as a senior subject because I want to work and live overseas as a pastry chef, especially in France, and I thought knowing the language will help me with finding a job and navigating my way through the country."

How will learning the French language and culture help you in your chosen career?

"As I am training to become a pastry chef, learning about the French language and culture will help me in my career for the rest of my life. Lots of French pastry chef write books in French which are not usually available in English for another 12 months. Knowing French means I will have access to the latest literature on French pastry making a year earlier than I would have. This will be a huge help to me in my career."

You will be taking part in the study trip to France in 2024. What do you hope to gain from this incountry experience?

"I hope to gain a few things from this trip. The main one being my French speaking skills and understanding what other people are saying. But also new ideas for me to use in pastry competitions. I hope to try a new pastry most days while I am in France."

Where do you see yourself in 5 years' time?

"In 5 years' time I would have just finished my apprenticeship and will be ready to move overseas for six months to two years. This is where learning French will really start to become extremely helpful as I am not only limited to English speaking jobs. And, as I plan on moving to France and working in many Europe countries where French is a largely spoken language, it will be of huge benefit to me."

Have you been able to use your French in a real-life situation?

"I recently went to France. I was on a bus full of English speakers. The bus driver only spoke French and Spanish. I was able to use my French to translate the driver's instructions. For example, when we made a stop for sightseeing, the bus driver asked me to translate his instructions from French into English about how long we would be stopping and what time to return to the bus. I was really pleased with myself that I was able to perform this role."

"Hi everyone! My name is Casper, and I am taking the Year 9 and 10 Latin Course. One of my favourite things to do other than learning other languages is to sing, and I am very lucky to be a member of the Australian Girls' Choir for over 10 years now, starting when I was 6 years old. Recently I had the wonderful opportunity to go on our International Tour 2023, the first one the AGC have had since Covid after a four year hiatus. I and 55 other members of the choir from the six different cities we are based in (Sydney, Melbourne, Brisbane, Perth, Adelaide and Canberra), had the incredible honour to go on a three week tour of Italy and France.

We started off in Rome, then moved on to Marostica, spending a day in Venice, then Annecy, St Amant de Boixe and finishing off in Versailles after spending a day in Paris. Those three weeks I spent there were honestly the best three weeks of my life, as I made so many new friends, saw the most incredible sights and sang and danced in hundreds of years' old churches, some even as old as the 11th century, or even the church in the Vatican city where Mozart performed in a few hundred years ago. It truly felt like history followed us wherever we went, and that the legacy of the choristers who had come before us, and the civilians who would have lived there thousands of years ago, were seeing what we were doing and singing along with us.

Being a student of Latin, I am often asked what the point of learning a 'dead language' is, and people tell me that because no one speaks it anymore that there is no use for it. Sometimes it's hard to argue, but during this trip, I really felt as if the language I was learning was so important to understanding parts of human history. When we were in Italy, Latin followed me wherever we went. In a village surrounded by a castle (Marostica), in a church celebrating 50 years of the Australian Embassy to the Holy See (Rome) and even in a church in Annecy, France. Walking around and being able to understand and read centuries' old inscriptions on historical walls is a memory that I will never forget, and even seeing in person the ruins of the places I learnt about, like the Circus Maximus, or the Colosseum brought me such joy. I'm sure I was insufferable to my friends because every second I was translating something new, or taking pictures to translate when I got back home to Australia. The reason I give people, when I am asked why I learn this language, is because it is so rewarding and this tour did nothing but reaffirm that.

Now that I'm back home and back at my schoolwork, I'm reminded every time I start a new module how incredible our history truly is, and what the point is of learning such a difficult language. I am so grateful for the opportunities I've had this year and am looking forward to the opportunities yet to come both with Latin, and with the AGC. Hopefully, I'll get to go again, but regardless, this experience I've had is one that I will never forget. I give all my thanks to my parents, the AGC staff and fellow choristers (Sarah, for being my model in Venice), the amazing families who hosted us, and to my beautiful Latin teacher, Franca Calorio, for giving me a stunning new angle to human history. "
