

Our school community now boasts an impressive 2700 students enrolled to learn languages. A special acknowledgment goes out to our Enrolments team whose tireless efforts ensured the smooth processing and assessment of applications, allowing students from all schools to pursue their language studies.

In this newsletter, we celebrate the exceptional achievements of our students during the 2023 Higher School Certificate (HSC) Examinations. The results of the 2023 HSC were remarkable, with **eleven students in first place in their language course**, and an additional 44 students securing positions within the top 5 of their courses.

Yet, in my view, every student who enrolled and completed a course with us deserves recognition as a high achiever. Their resilience and dedication to navigating an online learning environment are truly commendable. The skills and knowledge acquired through their studies lay a solid foundation for future endeavours. Our recent Information Evening drew an impressive turnout, with over 400 parents and carers in attendance. 

- Identify when the weekly speaking lessons are scheduled
- Access/Print the relevant Course schedule from our <u>website</u> which indicates the workload. Lesson days and assessment dates
- Monitor the completion of work according to the Course schedule
- Encourage attendance at our Face to Face Lesson days if possible.

High School and HSC: Why push the perpetually falling boulder?

"As high-school students, we all have experienced the aspiration for a high assessment mark and then the frustration to be weighed down by a bad mark.

The truth is that we, students, are modern-day Sisyphus: we lug a heavy rock up a hill only for it to roll down, entirely nullify our efforts and (tragically) beckon us to start again. Too often, the weight of a high school workload makes us think to give up, to imagine that school doesn't exist, and to go through the high school in cruise control.



However, it is necessary to accept the largest burden we can find in order to obtain some long term satisfaction.

During my time in year 11 Latin Continuers with my brilliant teacher Mrs Calorio, we studied an unseen text where I saw this theme emerge. We translated a story about Milo of Croton (for gym junkies reading this, he was the winner of the first Olympic Games and instigator of modern-day knowledge on progressive overload).

The story goes that every day for four years, Milo would borrow his neighbour's calf and walk up and down the hills of his Greek island before returning it. The calf would grow, and the weight would increase until the animal developed into a fully grown bull. Yet, by the time that it was a bull, Milo had gradually developed in strength, proportional to the weight of the animal he holstered, making the bull seamlessly light.

This is what the education system aims to do, in my eyes. If you can accept that you will earnestly shoulder the tasks that your teachers set for you and stay consistent with your studies, I believe that you will become a successful student for whatever your academic goals may be.

As for some more practical advice, I'll offer three habits that helped me achieve my results, particularly with NSL.

Firstly, if you're not ahead, you're already behind. The advantageous aspect about NSL (at least for Latin Continuers) is that you have all the work that you need to do (and when it ought to be done) spelt out clearly. Make use of this by ploughing a couple weeks ahead, and then spending the weeks before assessments revising rather than learning.

Secondly, don't track the hours you study and (I know this is controversial), don't lock in to a hyper-strict timetable. Each week of school is different, and putting a certain amount of hours into a subject can lead to a false sense of security. This is because the number of hours you put into study does not necessarily equate to the mark you will get out, as your knowledge and skills will plateau by a certain point. As such, I highly recommend checklists and to-do lists as an alternative, as being able to tick off concrete tasks (irrespective of how long or short they take to complete) will by far outweigh meaningless hours that achieved nothing but looking over the same things that you already know and provide you with the confidence to approach any exam.

Finally, find ways that you can make the subjects you study relevant to the hobbies that you enjoy. For me, I was always passionate about the gym, anatomy, and biology, and so Latin fitted so seamlessly into the mixture. Biological nomenclature is all based in Latin, and so learning the etymological story made remembering and appreciating the names so much easier.

To wrap up, in terms of committing yourself to your work, don't fret if you don't get it right every time you come to study. Nobody does, and you probably will have the occasional school-night spent aimlessly scrolling Instagram (we've all been there). Always remember, however, that, if you keep pushing the burden, you will end up with a job well done. As they say: if you want to grow a tree, the best time was 30 years ago, but the second best time is today."

Italian Stage 4 Rural and Remote Program

The Rural and Remote Program, run by the NSW School Of Languages offers the opportunity for students in rural areas to study the mandatory 100 hours of Languages in Stage 4. The students are taught in class groups of approximately 15 students. The program provides for one live lesson taught via video conference and then two other lessons with a supervising teacher in their day school per week, where they work through language activities in their 'Digital Workbooks' related to what they'd covered during the live lesson.

This program was established in 2020 and is currently running at Hay War Memorial High School, Barraba Central School and Tumbarumba High School.

> Indonesian and Literature, along with the other Asian languages, was officially implemented into the NSW Board of Studies HSC subjects in 2001. The NSW School of Languages has a long and proud history of achieving top of state results and high band achievement.

> From 2002, when numbers were at 112 students, to the peak period of 2011 - 2016 the course was attracting more than 150 candidates, including students from overseas and interstate within Australia.

Unfortunately, due to significant drops in students after the mid 2000s, NESA decided that 2024 would be the final year that this historical course would come to an end. We in Indonesian will miss our 'old friend' and the many happy memories accrued over the years during the teaching of the course.







EAL/D Focus on Writing task





"Hi everyone! My name is Kai Kubota, I am a 2023 HSC graduate, and an incoming first-year student at Waseda University in Japan 2024. I studied Japanese in Context at NSL in Years 11 and 12, and I hope that sharing my own experiences will inspire students to pursue new opportunities that are born from language learning. I am deeply grateful for this opportunity to share my story, so if you could read the article until the end, it would be an honour.

Just like many other fellow students, I had a hard time determining what my future should be following graduation. While studying overseas was always an option, it seemed too distant to take seriously. However, thanks to my time studying Japanese In Context as part of my HSC, I furthered my linguistic abilities and developed my understanding and interest in Japan, which turned my thoughts into more realistic ideas. I was able to begin to think seriously about where I could study and what I wanted to do in the near future.

NSL helped me gain the knowledge, training, and the myriad of skills necessary to complete all the application procedures and be considered for admission to multiple Japanese universities. NSL provided me with the adequate background to ensure I was offered a number of places at Japanese universities, including in my first-choice course. Firstly, the structure of learning was extremely effective in developing my Japanese language ability at my own pace. Through the course and its assessments, I was able to learn how to write articles, letters, and persuasive pieces, while receiving guidance on how to express my ideas and present well in interviews. Over the course of the two years, through repetition and feedback from the teachers, my Japanese skill set dramatically improved.

Furthermore, the topics covered in the curriculum helped me develop a wider understanding of a range of subjects and issues related to Japanese and Australian culture. Not only did it teach critical thinking skills, but I strongly believe it fostered a deeper cultural understanding. By explaining, discussing, or debating such topics in the weekly Zoom sessions, the course taught me Japanese in a much greater multi-dimensional way. Finally, the in-person lesson days were a great way to connect and communicate with fellow students studying the same course. Speaking to people with similarly unique, cross-cultural backgrounds with similar aspirations empowered me with the confidence to pursue studying overseas. Being immersed in a global environment I believe is a major positive aspect of the In-Context course.
